COD acts to better serve vets returning from war

PALM DESERT — Veterans returning home from the wars in rolling at College of the Desert in record numbers, and school officials are making plans to accommodate their growing ranks.

The COD Foundation recently

launched a campaign to develop a full-service veterans resource center at the Donald and Peggy Cravens Student Services Center.

There are more than 400 veter-Iraq and Afghanistan are en- ans now attending classes at the college, said Donni Prince, COD's veterans specialist.

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years," she said. "As the military is downsizing, more students are coming. There are no jobs out there, so they're going to school."

The foundation hopes to raise \$450,000 for the project, which includes remodeling a room at the Cravens Center and hiring part-time academic and mental health specialists.

The 1,200-square-foot center is scheduled to open in the fall of 2012.

Big Horn Golf Club Charities—a nonprofit organization established by the golf club in Palm Desert — has donated \$150,000 for the naming rights of the center.

"One of the primary issues facing combat veterans is the social isolation they feel when they return," said Jim Hummer, assistant to the president and executive director of the COD Foundation. VETERANS RESOURCE CENTER

Services will include:

■ Veterans specialist: The current full-time specialist helps students and their families access VA benefits. She also processes VA paperwork and provides information about academic programs and degree requirements.

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■ Academic counselor: A part-time counselor will be hired to provide academic and career counseling services, develop student education plans, offer study skills and career development workshops, and make referrals to mental health services, as needed.

■ Mental health specialist: A part-time psychological services counselor will be hired to address mental health issues related to adjusting to college life, and the stress of returning from combat.

■ Computer and Internet access: The center will include four computer stations with Internet access. The computers will have all the necessary software programs to allow students to work on their class assignments, and access email and other online campus resources.

■ Study/tutorial area: An area where students can study independently or in small groups. Students can bring their laptops and use the free wireless access to the Internet via the campus Wi-Fi network. Peer tutors will be brought in as needed to assist students with gateway courses, including math and English.

■ Student lounge: The lounge area will include comfortable seating and a flat-screen TV. The space will give students the opportunity to talk candidly with fellow veterans and engage in peer-to-peer mentoring activities.
